Introduction Overview

FFEU partnered with PSB Research to conduct a survey of American Evangelical Christians and Muslims.

This research aims to deepen the understanding of existing relationships and perceptions among American Evangelical Christians and Muslims, and identify opportunities for engagement between the two groups. Specifically, this research will:

- Determine how the two groups perceive one another
- Understand social interactions between the two groups
- Discover areas of common ground and points of contention



Introduction Methodology

PSB conducted 1,000 online interviews nationwide between January 3rd-15th, 2019

Throughout this presentation we cite a previous PSB poll conducted in 2018 comparing similar attitudes among Jewish and Muslim audiences

- American Evangelical Christians who interact with Muslims frequently (N=103, MoE = +/-9.66%)
- American Muslims who interact with Evangelical Christians frequently (N=269, MoE = +/-5.98%)

KEY FINDINGS

- American Evangelical Christians and Muslims see many similarities in their religious values and rituals. Both groups place high importance on daily prayer, family, and making the world a better place for everyone, and pray and attend religious services at similar frequencies.
- However, these similarities get buried beneath a lack of understanding between the two religions, and both groups see room for improvement in their relationship with each other. In particular, Evangelicals are more likely to see differences between the two religions and are not as familiar with Muslim terms/holidays as Muslims are with Christian terms/holidays.
- ❖ Frequent interaction between the faiths would likely bring out similarities between the religions. Evangelicals and Muslims who frequently interact with the other faith more often view the other religion as inclusive, evolving, and modern.
- ❖ Both groups acknowledge that Muslims face significant discrimination based on their faith. Evangelicals and Muslims alike agree that there is at least some anti-Muslim sentiment in the Evangelical community, but Evangelicals perceive more anti-Evangelical sentiment from the Muslim community than Muslims do.
- * While the groups share positions on a few key political issues (healthcare, religious freedom, immigration), few current news events present room for compromise. Evangelicals tend to fall in line with President Trump on things like the travel ban, the migrant caravan, and moving the U.S. embassy in Israel to Jerusalem, while Muslims tend to side against the President.
- ❖ Both Evangelicals and Muslims are receptive and favorable toward Muslim nations cooperating with and supporting Israel.






INTERACTION WITH THE OTHER FAITH

Do you have any family members or close friends who are Muslim/Evangelical Christian?







RELATIONSHIP

Evangelicals overestimate how important rituals and clothing/dress are to Muslims, who in turn underestimate the importance of daily prayer to Evangelicals




Both American Evangelicals and Muslims pray and attend religious services at similar frequencies: a majority pray more than once a day and attend religious services at least once a week







How often do you attend religious services?








COMPARING RELIGIONS


Evangelicals are more likely to see differences between the two religions; frequent interactions lead to more perceived similarities





COMPARING VIEWS


The more frequently Evangelicals and Muslims interact, the more likely they are to see the other faith as inclusive and progressive





KNOWLEDGE OF ISLAMIC TERMS


Evangelicals show low familiarity of Muslim terms/holidays, but many of those familiar are able to correctly define those terms/holidays

Muslims report strong familiarity and understanding of Christian terms/holidays








Evangelicals and Muslims alike acknowledge that Muslims have been discriminated against because of their faith








Do you feel that you have ever been discriminated against because of your faith?

How many Americans who share your faith would you estimate have been discriminated against because of it?








Do you feel that you have ever been discriminated against because of your faith? How many Americans who share your faith would you estimate have been discriminated against because of it?








Do you think that American Evangelical Christians have been discriminated against based on their faith?



(IF YES) How many of them would you estimate have been discriminated against because of their faith?


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


Both Evangelicals and Muslims agree that there is at least some anti-Muslim sentiment in the Evangelical Christian community

Do you think there is more, less, or the same amount of anti-Muslim sentiment in the Evangelical Christian community as there is in the U.S. population overall?*






Evangelical Christians perceive much more anti-Evangelical sentiment from the Muslim community than Muslims believe exists

Do you think there is more, less, or the same amount of anti-Evangelical Christian sentiment in the American Muslim community as there is in the U.S. population overall?*




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Evangelicals do not give equal consideration to Muslim holidays; many view America as a Christian nation

Open End Responses

Evangelicals who are opposed often say that Muslim holidays are not American or that America is a Christian country

"Because I believe our country is based on Christian beliefs and I honestly do not believe we could accommodate every religious holiday of every religion in America."

"This country was founded on Christian principles; if we included Muslim holidays, we would have to celebrate every religious holiday of every faith."

Muslims that say yes reference equality and fairness as top reasons

"Because Christians get Christmas off and all of their celebrations off, so should the Muslim community."

"If a religious holiday such as Christmas is nationally celebrated, so too should Eid or Hanukkah. Or none should be nationally recognized. Equal treatment is key."


Muslims did not vote for President Trump and express strong disapproval of his performance in office; Evangelicals voted for and continue to support Trump







TRAVEL BAN

Evangelicals and Muslims do not agree on the travel ban – Evangelicals are more likely to support it, while Muslims consider it a "Muslim ban"

In June 2018, the U.S. Supreme Court upheld a ban proposed by President Donald Trump that indefinitely suspends the issuance of immigrant and non-immigrant visas to applicants from Libya, Iran, Somalia, Syria, Yemen, North Korea, and Venezuela. Do you support or oppose this ban?*



Many of the countries included in President Donald Trump's travel ban are majority Muslim, prompting some to refer to it as a "Muslim ban." Which of the following is closer to your view?







With regard to the ongoing migrant caravan issue, which of the following is closest to your opinion?






JCPOA

Evangelicals tend to approve of President Trump's decision to pull out of the JCPOA, while Muslims are not nearly as supportive

In May 2018, President Donald Trump pulled out of the Joint Comprehensive Plan of Action (JCPOA) that was agreed upon between Iran and a group of world powers (U.S., United Kingdom, Russia, France, China, Germany, and the European Union) and announced he would re-impose economic sanctions on Iran, which he did in the fall of 2018. 




JAMAL KHASHOGGI







Evangelicals strongly support U.S. policies towards Israel – including moving the U.S. embassy to Jerusalem – while Muslims do not










APPENDIX - RELIGIOUS RITUALS

Which of the following religions do you think is the most similar to your own in its beliefs and practices?









The majority of Evangelicals and Muslims do not feel that they have been discriminated against based on their political beliefs










How many Americans who share your political beliefs would you estimate have been discriminated against because of it?

Evangelicals believe in the centrality of the conversion or "born again" experience in eceiving salvation, in the authority of the Scripture as God's revelation to humanity, and in spreading the Christian message."
